Connecting Angels, Auras & Color Codes

With Radleigh Valentine & Dougall Fraser

Colette:

Hi there, and welcome to Inside the Wooniverse, a podcast brought to you from the corner of fringe and main, I'm your host, Colette Baron-Reid. Today, we are joined, not by just one, but by two fantastic guests and dear friends of mine, Radleigh Valentine and Dougall Fraser. And let me start by saying that being friends with Radleigh is like having Harry Potter as your BFF. Not only is he an angel communicator and tarot master, but he's also a celebrated spiritual teacher, speaker, and bestselling Hay House author. And he's totally adorable. Radleigh brilliantly embodies the magic of life, and continuously inspires audiences all over the world, bringing them angelic messages of pure love and unconditional support.

Now, Dougall is an internationally renowned psychic, cosmic coach, and author, and he's super famous in Japan, I'm just letting you know. His expertise lies in deciphering the color energy surrounding us all. His parents used to say that from the time he could talk, all he talked about was seeing color and the energy around people. His connection to auras and energy will inspire you, I promise you that.

Together, Radleigh and Dougall are seriously spiritual BFFs and Hay House colleagues who discovered interesting parallels between the worlds of angels and color energy. So they call their system Angels & Auras. So they have an oracle deck and a certification program, and we are just so happy that I got both of you here at the same time, I'm super excited. Welcome to the Wooniverse, Radleigh and Dougall.

Radleigh: Hey!

Dougall: Good morning, hello, hello, hello!



All right, let's dig in. I'm going to start with Radleigh. Radleigh, let us go back to the very, very beginning, to itty bitty Radleigh. Now, what was your childhood like? When did you start to sense guides and angels? Because I know that was pretty early for you.

Radleigh:

Yeah, I was five. I got my first angel nudge when I was five years old. It's funny, because I didn't know what it was, I didn't know how to identify it. I was lucky, because we're part Cherokee, and so my mom was like... Half the time she was Methodist, the other time we were Cherokee mysticism. It was like, "Which way is the wind blowing?" So it's like when I started to talk about stuff like this, she was like, "It's okay, this is cool. We're going to trust this, this is groovy, no worries." But I didn't really know what I was really doing. And I don't think it was really until my early twenties, where I really started to dive deep into the world of angels and spirituality and metaphysics, that I started to go, "Oh, all of this is starting to make sense now." I was starting to hear my angels' voices, and I'm like, "I know this voice." So, I was just a little wee one in high weeds back then, so yeah.

Colette:

High weeds, I love that. And how did it make you feel? Did you ever feel somehow more connected to people, more disconnected? Was it to nature? How did it really translate, in your experience, growing up as you as a person?

Radleigh:

Nobody has ever asked me that question, so I'm just going bleh, just spitting out the truth. I think it made me more distrustful of people, because it's like-

Colette:

Oh, interesting.

Radleigh:

Immediately, I was like, "He's lying. He's lying. She's lying. That's not true. That isn't real." So I think that I never thought about this before, and I already was not trustful of people as a child anyway, because I was growing up gay in Knoxville, Tennessee in the '70s, not a fun combo.

And so I think all of those things already made me think people are not nice. And so I just basically... Oh my goodness, I was a jaded child! I never thought about it before!

Colette:

Isn't that funny? Because you're not that at all now.

Radleigh:

No, I'm not, I'm not.

Colette:

Of all the friends, of all the people I know, I have never, A, heard you ever say a bad word about anybody when you could have, you have always been so open and kind and consistently loving to everybody. So I find that fascinating that you grew up a jaded [inaudible 00:04:11].

Radleigh:

No, but think about it. It's kind of the other side of the coin, right? It's like if you see the world as that way, and you don't want to be that way, the other side of the coin is to be honest. Right? Is to be.... Yeah, and Dougall and I are both people pleasers, we talk about this all the time. And it's like there was also that aspect of my personality, which is like, I just wanted everybody to like me, because nobody did in school.

Colette:

Aw.

Radleigh:

And so I just wanted everyone to like me. Oh no, it's okay! It's all right.

Colette:

No, I know!



Radleigh:

I wouldn't change a thing. I wouldn't! I wouldn't change a thing, because the thing about it is it made me who I am today. And all the sweet, super kind things you said about me, I think are there because of having the alternate experience.

Colette:

And I wonder, do you think that the angels helped you, again, growing up with the sense of something beyond this world, accept yourself more, love yourself more? Because really, I do think that the capacity to love others comes from a deep sense of self-acceptance, which I know you have.

Radleigh:

Mm-hmm. Yeah, I do think so. Definitely not to ding school too much, but it was Tennessee, and we were 49th in the country for education, so our motto was, "Thank God for Mississippi." So that was our educational motto. So it's once I got out of school, and started being an adult-ish, and then really getting into spirituality, that's where the self-acceptance came. That's where it was like, "Okay, the angels love me, they really, really love me." And that's where I started to be like, "Okay, I'm cool, I'm good. I'm all right." So, yeah, I think angels helped me survive growing up, but then angels helped me thrive once I was an adult.

Colette:

Right. Ooh, what a great, great way of putting it. So Dougall, let's go back to your childhood, because I know you also, when you were little, you were seeing it, as did I too. I used to think that just meant everybody was holy, because I kept seeing auras around everybody, this big, nice thing I saw in church. So what was it like for you growing up in your family and the environment, the psychic environment, and what was your experience with that?

Dougall:

So, just like you said in the intro, my earliest memory was standing in the crib and telling my parents that I was seeing energy and hearing voices. And similarly to Radleigh, I had a very encouraging mother, who was super curious about it and interested. There was a little bit of a divide with my parents. My dad sent me to the doctor to get my eyes checked, and they wanted

me to go to therapy, because they were a little bit confused. But when I was eight, my mom took me to Lilydale, and that's when I had my first reading. I know, I know.

Colette:

That's so cool.

Dougall:

And I remember the woman telling me that I had a red aura, and it was the first time I had heard another person validate the experience that I was having, which was so cool. And I bought a deck of tarot cards and I got a crystal.

But there was a lot going on in my family. At age eight, my sister was diagnosed with leukemia, so the topic of mortality was sort of on the table. And then at school, I did a book report on kids having NDEs, and I did a diorama where I put cotton balls on the bottom and I hung angels from the top. And everybody's talking about their favorite actor, and their favorite sports person. And I stand up and I'm like, "Did you know when people cross, they talk about seeing a light at the end of the tunnel?" All of these ideas of the afterlife and spirituality were just sort of woven into who I was. But also, to echo what Radleigh said, I think it was also survivor stuff. I'm a sexual abuse survivor, so my ability to read the room was about survival. Is this safe? Will you make fun of me? It was really about a survival tactic first, before I even discovered spiritual awareness and self-help, and inner growth, and inner knowing. In the beginning, I think for me, it was really about survival.

Colette:

Yeah. Wow. That's amazing. So yeah, I identify with this too. You're looking for potential threats, and then you actually, inadvertently, develop the psychic muscle, because you've got eyes in the back of your head, because what could happen next? And the people pleasing thing is like, well, that's how we survive. I have Libra rising, I always say I have people pleasing-

Radleigh:

Oh wow, right.

... Rising in my chart.

Dougall:

And I think it wasn't until I started feeling safe that I thought, "Oh, this isn't just about, "Is there danger?" This can also be about "Is there magic? Is there potential? And is there love? And is there awareness?"" It starts to shift once you feel safe, for me.

Colette:

Yeah. Oh, I love that. And it's like a bridge, it's very cool. What inspired the two of you to create Angels & Auras course? Here we are, fast-forward to where we are now. You guys are hysterical together, but I've seen you teach. It's brilliant. It's absolutely brilliant. So, what brought you together to talk about this? And because I know so many people are so excited that you were able to bridge these two worlds, and actually show people how easy it is to access this realm. So let's talk about that.

Radleigh:

The first thing I want to say is that I have to point out, for those who are listening to this podcast and cannot see, that Dougall was told that in his first reading that his aura was red, and he is wearing a red shirt right now.

Dougall:

I didn't even think of that. And I'm the color expert.

Radleigh:

I know, right? So I just had to point that out. So, we first got connected because Dougall joined the Hay House family. And I already knew of Dougall's work, I had watched him on television, I already knew about him. So I reached out and said, "Hey!" And we connected, and I think our first phone call was 90 minutes, because it was just that way. The whole Angels & Auras thing, my favorite way of putting it is that, and it dates us a little bit, but my way of putting it is that he got peanut butter on my chocolate, and I got chocolate on his peanut butter. Because I started talking about angels, as I'm wont to do, he started talking about auras and colors, he was wont to do, and we started to have this flip out on Hay House Radio, I think, wasn't it?

Dougall: Yeah.

Radleigh:

It was literally on Hay House Radio that we were flipping out, going, "But wait, what? Hey, wait!"

Dougall: Yeah.

Radleigh:

And we noticed a connection.

Dougall:

I think it was Jophiel was the first time we were doing a tandem reading, and I immediately said to the caller, "I see pink around you." And you said, "That's so interesting, because Jophiel is here, and she often presents herself in pink." And then I would start defining the color. And then at first, we've been doing this for years, and we just kept saying, "Oh, that's so weird. How random." And then by the 40th time it was like-

Colette:

How random.

Dougall:

"Huh. That's not so random."

Colette:

That's not so random, right? This is like you have the color code for the angels built into what you see and experience. And isn't it interesting, though, that the language, the lexicon of imagery, of consciousness that comes to us, is filtered through what we're meant to see. And for you, it's the color, and Radleigh knows the name that goes with the color. And the two of you now are like, "Woo!" And it really is very helpful for people to be able to make that connection to both the color and the angel, and what it means, and how you can have a relationship with this



other realm of potentiality. Because really, angels really represent what is possible in all of us as well. Would you say that's true?

Radleigh:

Oh yeah. Because I think there's also an element of The Brady Bunch in all of this, just to continue to date us back to the '70s, and that is, there was, (Singing). And it's like, I had all these students, and Dougall had his students. And so they just sort of came together when we started to teach together. And what I felt like was so important and so valuable was the whole element of the depth that it added to everything. For my angel students, it was one thing to say that Archangel Michael was sapphire blue, or that Jophiel was fuchsia pink. But for them, it was almost like an identifier. It was a way for them to go, "I'm seeing blue, so therefore it is Michael."

Colette:

Ah yeah, right. "Therefore it is." It's right. Yeah.

Radleigh:

For him, his students, it was like, "Well, blue means all of these things." And then suddenly, here's this angel that's blue that helps with all of those things.

Dougall: Right, yeah.

Colette:

Yes. That's so great.

Radleigh:

So, it really created this blending of disciplines that deepened everything for both families.

Colette:

So, let me ask you a question. Who's kind of cotton candy, pale pink? Because that's what I'm tuning into right now.

Radleigh:

That's Ariel.

Colette: Okay.
Radleigh: So, Ariel is the archangel of abundance and prosperity.
Colette: Right on.
Radleigh: But she's also the archangel of the natural kingdom. Now, if that pink for you is just a little bit deeper, a little bit more fuchsia-
Colette: Lighter.
Radleigh: then that's Jophiel. Oh, lighter?
Colette:

Radleigh:

Definitely poofy.

Lighter, yeah.

Okay, so then that's Ariel.

Radleigh:

Colette:

What's really interesting too is that I kind of think of you, with your auburn, burgundy, kind of reddish hair, Ariel has red hair to me, and she has a lot of-

There you go.

Radleigh:

... qualities that you do. She's very much into animals, she really loves animals, it's a big thing for her. If Ariel had a religion, she'd be an animist.

Colette:

Right, and I'm an animist!

Radleigh:

Exactly. She would, because-

Colette:

Yeah, that's what I am.

Radleigh:

... everything has life to Ariel. So, there's a reason why she would hang with you.

Colette:

Oh, wow. I love it. So, I'm going to ask you, Radleigh, because I know that there's some confusion for some people, and I know some of the listeners are going to be, they know what angels are, they know what auras are, but some people don't. So, why do people confuse angels with spirit guides? Can you explain the difference between the two of them?

Radleigh:

Yeah, yeah. Because apples, oranges.

Colette:

Right, both are fruit.

Radleigh:

Passed over loved ones, apples, oranges, bananas. So, the thing that I always tell people is that angels are messengers of God, most of their names end in E-L, which means "of God".

Colette:

Of God.

Radleigh:

They are extensions of the divine, of Source, of the universe, of Goddess, I don't care which word you use. Potato, potato. But the thing about angels is that they are omnipresent, they're always present in all ways and all things. You can ask Archangel Michael something, and so can 7 billion other people ask Archangel Michael. And what I love about angels is what I also love about the divine, is not putting either thing in a box, because they don't fit in a box. And so we tend to humanize these things. We try to say, "Oh, Archangel Michael's the head of all the archangel..." No. The archangels don't need a hierarchy. They don't need one.

Colette:

Whereas the spirit guides are more like Brad from Buffalo.

Radleigh:

I agree. Exactly.

Colette:

Right? So as opposed to Gabriel from God.

Radleigh:

Right, right. That's exactly, it's like people will say all the time, "Well, my grandmother is my guardian angel." Well, no. Is your grandmother with you all the time? Sure. But she is not an angel. It's not the same thing. These are literal extensions of the divine, of Source, and for the most part, have not had a human incarnation.



Right, right, right. So, spirit guides typically... Because I was on tour with Sylvia Browne for a long time, many, many years ago in 2006 or something, and she would spit out all these names, and it did sounded like it's Myrtle from Stockholm, or-

Radleigh:

That sounds very much like her, yes.

Colette:

... like Brad from Buffalo. And I'd be like, "Who?" Do you know what I mean? Yeah. And I'm like, "I don't think I have those kind of people." So I don't know. I was always really curious about that, because I don't... Yeah.

Dougall:

I like that you use the word "curious about that".

Colette:

Yeah, I was very curious. It was very curious, yes. No, because it's funny, because I know a lot of people are really connected to spirit guides, and I have this sense of their guides in the hidden realms, but they morph, and they're not boxed in, they're more amorphous.

Dougall:

I agree with you, Colette. People always ask me in sessions, "What's my spirit guide's name?" And I feel like that's the human part of us that wants to give them a name and a title, history. But to me, when I'm super clear, to me it sounds like a symposium of energy, that sort of presents itself in one voice. And sometimes, they've taken shape, and I've seen hair, but I believe that's my brain trying to understand what's going on.

Colette:

This is so interesting, because when I had finished Messages From Spirit, my TV show, I was so fried because I had done, I don't know how many, three shows a day for 30 days or whatever? And so by the end of it, I couldn't hold myself together. And so I kept hearing a chorus of voices that called themselves Fred.

Dougall	:
Yesl	

And I'm like, "Who are you?" "Fred, Fred, Fred, Fred, we are Fred!"

Radleigh:

We are Fred.

Colette:

You are we, you are we. No, I'm serious. And then they kept showing me... Oh my God, I wrote about it in my book, Uncharted, about the experience of tuning into these voices that sounded like, they felt like angels, but they wanted me to look up their name, which was Fred, and then they showed me Garth, from Wayne's World, and I never saw Wayne's World, so I had to call around and go, "What's that character that that guy with the wig played in Saturday Night Live?" Because I never saw the movie. And then I realized, "Oh my God, this is the ruler of peace, and to look after the garden because, Garth represented the garden." And I'm like, "I am freaking out now!"

And it wasn't consistent. And I would never tell anybody that it was, but for a period of time, I heard a chorus called Fred, that was very present. But they weren't like the spirit guides that I know to be a spirit guide. And as a medium, I tune into people who've crossed over, and God forbid I ever have one of them follow me around, I don't want them guys, go away and go get your shit together, and come back!

Dougall:

I used to think I was doing it wrong, because I didn't have a specific spirit guide, because I would look up to-

Colette:

Me too.



Dougall:

... other spiritual teachers, who had one with a very specific name and this really specific relationship. And mine always felt like it was evolving and transforming and shifting. So to me, I always say to clients, it's kind of like you're listening to an orchestra and the music is beautiful, but you're asking me to pause and talk about the one violin. And we can do that, and we can stop and we can, but you're going to miss the music.

Colette:

Oh my God, that's so interesting that you said that.

Dougall:

You know what I mean?

Colette:

Yes.

Dougall:

Yeah, yeah.

Colette:

That's very interesting. It was very musical. That's a really interesting thing, and you don't want to take them apart.

Okay, so I have so many questions. Okay, Dougall, back to you again. Why is color so important? You have such a way of seeing this and teaching people, what are some of the aura colors and their meanings? Because I know that you don't go through the colors according to the chakras, for example, it's something very different. Your color scope is different. And I'm curious. And then Radleigh, I'd love to talk to you about how they match the angels. So maybe one color at a time, you guys figure it out.

Dougall:

So basically, the reason I love the language of color is that it's tangible. It doesn't matter what religious background you're from, your age group, where you're born in the world, if I ask



someone what their favorite color is, they immediately have an answer. So it's already a conversation. In the world of spirituality, sometimes we think of things like chakras, and I think, "Well, am I really opening my root chakra? Can I see it? Can I feel it?" So sometimes it feels a little bit abstract. If I ask someone to visualize the color green, and they become still with the color green, they actually begin to visualize it, they understand it. You can surround yourself with it. Even when you were talking earlier about the color pink, every single person pretty much has some kind of a relationship with pink. They like it, they dislike it. So it's just a conversation starter, it's a good bridge between worlds. When it comes to the aura, it's the one body of work that is not stagnant. Meaning, when you're born, your astrology chart pretty much stays the same. Your numerology stays the same, it's fixed.

Colette:

It's fixed, right.

Dougall:

But your aura, depending on the environment and the topic, is constantly changing. If you're at a holiday meal, and Uncle Joe says something unpleasant at the table, the whole family's vibe shifts. You can feel the shift of the air in the room. That, my friends, is your aura reacting to the environment. So the color changes, the vibration changes, the feeling changes. And what I love about that awareness is knowing that we can use color, both physically and from our imagination or a spiritual perspective, to shift the energy of the room. If I see red around someone, they're really emotional, they're an empath, they're sensitive, they feel the energy of other people, they're curious about the energy exchange, they tend to be healers. I might prescribe gold to them for balance, which is more practical. It's thought, it's vision, it's thinking. So we can shift our energy according to what we need in the environment or what makes us feel best, and I just think that's super, super cool.

Colette:

Me too! So, how about picking out a few colors that Radleigh can match? You have a spectrum. I know there's so many different versions of that spectrum, but let's just pick out a few of them. And if Radleigh could say... You can tell me what does it mean to a person studying the aura, and then Radleigh can say, "Okay, and here is how it matches in the angelic realm." Could we do that?



Dougall:

Okay, cool. So in the oracle deck, what we did is we have 12 core cards that represent 12 colors that are sort of like a personal journey, it's like a personal exploration. So let's start with blue, which is one of our favorite cards. For me, blue has always looked like stacks and stacks of books, because it's the color of truth and wisdom. Anytime I see blue around someone, I see stacks and stacks of books in front of them, behind them, to the side, because this person loves information, truth, it's about protection, it's about knowing, it's about feeling safe, it's really deep and exploratory. So a blue person is oftentimes trying to make sure that other people are being treated well, they want to make sure that they're safe and they're protected. But it's really about gaining enough wisdom as possible to be independent and set things in motion. And so for Rad, one of the things we discovered was blue...

Colette: Radleigh?

Radleigh:

That it represents Archangel Michael. So, in this particular deck, we have this image of Archangel Michael, it's all sapphirey-blue, and Michael is sitting at a desk and it looks like a library. He's got this book open. You can think of it as the Book of Wisdom. There are all these books on either side of him that are stacked high, because his desire, his knowledge for wisdom and truth, is literally insatiable. It is just as omnipresent as Archangel Michael is. He has, in his lap, just barely out of view, the sword of truth that he carries with him. It is a sword of light from which he uses to sever energetic connections to the things that are unhealthy and undivine for us. And so we both love Michael for this particular image. We love him for that particular aspect of the fact that he is so radiantly blue, so much about the truth, so much about honesty, so much about wisdom, so much about the things that are truly the good things about the human beings and human race. And that just matches perfectly what Dougall just said.

Dougall:

But it's also really important, Colette, that Michael be nerdy cute. Michael's-

Colette:

Nerdy cute?



Dougall:

... oftentimes, yeah, oftentimes, he's seen as this warrior sort of energy, but this time we were like, "We need him to be nerdy cute." Like book smart, super cute glasses. This is what we do behind the scenes.

Colette:

I love it.

Radleigh:

What's interesting about that is that that was one of the things that Dougall was like, "He needs to be nerdy cute." A lot of people really perceive Archangel Michael to being super hunky, he's got lots of muscles, he's in armor, he's got long blonde hair and blue eyes.

Colette:

A warrior.

Radleigh:

And yet he's never shown himself to me like that. My Archangel Michael is Clark Kent. Okay? He's got the glasses. He is super cute, he is handsome, but it's none of that grandiose stuff. And there's nothing wrong with that version of Archangel Michael, because the angels are omnipresent. They have the ability to present themselves to everybody in the way that they need to see them. It doesn't make sense to present to a young African American girl this blonde, hunky Archangel Michael, that's not how she's going to see him. And so we've tried to make sure that we were way more diverse than that. But it's like for us, he said it. And I'm like, "But that's how I see him." So we just continued that way.

Colette:

I love that. What about turquoise? Is there a turquoise relationship between a color description and an angel?

Dougall:

Do you want to start this time around?

Radleigh:

Yeah, there is. Shock, shock. So there's-

Colette:

My favorite color.

Dougall:

Is that your favorite color, Colette?

Colette:

Yes.

Dougall:

That's interesting.

Radleigh:

Well, it's one of my favorite colors, too. So dude, you're just surrounded. So surrender. So Archangel Sandalphon is this archangel. He's known to be the archangel of music, Colette.

Colette:

Ah!

Radleigh:

But he's also known to be the archangel of prayer. And so, Archangel Sandalphon is said to be this archangel whose feet are on Earth, and his head is in heaven, or on the other side of the veil. And his job is to literally gather up all the prayers of the people of Earth, and weave them into a beautiful wreath that he takes and lays at the throne of Source, so that each prayer can be individually answered and read. And then those information can come back down to the people in a way in which they can interpret. So it's this color of faith, and it's this color of forgiveness, it's this color of this whole element of nothing that we do is so egregious that the Source and divine doesn't still just adore us and think we're the cutest little cutie pies that ever existed, because that's how Source sees us.

You just described pretty much everything I teach.

Radleigh:

Yep.

Colette:

That's pretty wild. I had no idea. That's wild. And Dougall, in your aura speak, what does turquoise represent?

Dougall:

So first of all, I'm fascinated that both of your... That's your favorite color, because turquoise is considered an ascension color. It's a color of ascension. It's considered the color of kindness and forgiveness. But what I describe is that when turquoise comes to someone, typically they've gone through something so intense, so in deep, that they have to rise above third dimension. They have to seek for something so pure to understand it, to gain wisdom. Typically, it's been a pretty big trauma. So that's why I call it a color of ascension. It's like, "I have to go really, really deep here." And then even though the wound may be big, the universe is still asking you to be kind. Everybody that's listening to this, we've all gone through stuff, and we have a choice; we can become bitter and resentful and shut down, or we can use it as fuel for wisdom and to become stronger and more positive and more loving and more glowing.

So turquoise in particular is a pretty powerful color. For me, again, not to go back to sexual abuse, but that's when turquoise presented itself, is how do you make sense of something so big? How do you make sense of something so painful, and still find wisdom in it? So turquoise taught me how to forgive. And forgiveness is a journey. It's not linear. I have to forgive, sometimes, multiple times a day, sometimes multiple times an hour. But it teaches me to rise above and find pure divine information. And that's why I like Radleigh talking about prayers. So if it's a color of ascension, there's all these hopes and dreams and questions being sent to the universe, and so turquoise sort of helps us rise up and tune into that.



Yeah, and I really believe that we weave the world into being. So I love that image of the woven wreath that you bring to the foot of Source, because God is the source of our supply. So events, material world, is an attribute of Source, not the main event. Okay, one more color. I'm going to throw it out because who knows. What about lavender?

Radleigh: Ooh.

Dougall:

So we're going to purple for lavender. Would you say?

Radleigh:

Yep. We're in the purple, within purple.

Colette:

Like a purple, yes.

Radleigh:

You want to start?

Dougall:

Yeah. So purple to me, first of all, Colette, that's the color that I see around you. I see purple and blue around you. So purple is-

Colette:

Really?

Dougall:

... considered the color of leadership and destiny. If you see a teeny tiny amount of purple around someone, it means that they're on the right path. If you see a lot of purple around someone, it means they're on the right path. But purple is also about empowering other people to be leaders. A purple wants other people to feel like they're on the right path, they want people

to feel empowered, they want justice for the world and people to be treated fairly. It's a curious color, it's movement of energy, but it's a really, really powerful color for leadership.

Colette:

Right, interesting, okay. I'll receive that. What about you, Radleigh? Who's on tap for purple?

Radleigh:

That leads us to Archangel Zadkiel. Z-A-D-K-I-E-L. Zadkiel.

Colette:

Somebody just told me they saw Zadkiel around me on the weekend.

Dougall:

Really?

Colette:

That's so weird. Yes.

Radleigh:

Thank you folks. Our work here is done. We hope you've enjoyed the podcast.

Colette:

That's crazy! See, you can tell that I don't know a whole lot about this, but I love hearing about it.

Dougall:

But isn't that the whole example, Radleigh, though? So there's the twofold message. I say that I see purple around Colette, and then she goes, "I'll accept that." And then she said, "Well, someone just said that they saw that around me."

Colette:

That's right!

Dougall:

So that's the universe's	way of	being I	ike, "Hello	?"
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This past weekend.

Dougall: Right.

Colette: Yeah.

Dougall: Very cool.

Radleigh:

It absolutely is, because it's like Zadkiel is all about that whole element of also forgiveness. Zadkiel is all about this element of, it's like I see the world in a certain way, and I am going to be loving and beloved of it, and therefore nothing is condemning in any way that is of significance. And Zadkiel is a leader, Zadkiel is the archangel that really does help us to be able to speak to our ability to intellectualize the right way to go in our lives, that can take us where we need to be. So there's this whole element of that message of you are on the right path, you are headed in the right direction, everything is going to be okay. My mantra these days is everything is going to be all right, because it always is.

Colette:

It always is, yeah.

Radleigh:

It's a peaceful mantra, and that's Zadkiel.

Colette:

I love that! Okay, we're going to take a little pause. More with Radleigh Valentine and Dougall Fraser when we come back. Don't go anywhere.

Welcome back. So Radleigh, my next question is how does your course and oracle deck teach people to connect with angel and auras, and what kind of activities or exercises are involved? This conversation is great. So would this be something that would be a common conversation in your course and the decks? How do people use this or experience it with you?

Radleigh:

The deck, if I step there for just a second, I'm a tarotist. I love my oracle card decks, but at heart, I'm a tarotist. And so Angels & Auras actually has a slight element of that in it. And so we have these 12 primary cards that are these significant combinations of angels and auras, and it's like the 12 cards. So in a way, it's like the Major Arcana of our oracle card deck. And then the rest of the cards are more Minor Arcana, they're more about this whole element of what is life like in particular? And so we've got these elements of these stories, and we've got this element in the cards that is Dougall basically giving a color prescription of how to manage those experiences. But one of the things that I think that we're particularly proud of is something that is very, very, very uncommon in oracle card deck, and that is the cards are literally designed to be read reversed.

Colette:

Oh, interesting, that's so... Mine are always designed to be read reversed, too.

Radleigh:

Most aren't. And it's like these in particular, there's a message that's upside right, and a message that is upside down. And so there are words that are upside right, and words that are upside down, so that if it flips upside down, you can read what the shadow message is.

Colette:

I love that.

Dougall:

And I think from the perspective of seeing energy, and I know both of you will understand this. First of all, anybody can see an aura, that's my belief system. I try to use the word perceive, because people become really attached to seeing energy.

Colette:

Yeah, perceive.

Dougall:

Yeah, so the goal with the deck is to take that off the table at first. If you pull a card and it's pink, we're going to start with pink. That's the energy that we're going with. You don't have to worry about seeing it. And then when we release that expectation, that's when energy really starts to begin, because the brain... I've been doing this for so long, and my brain will still think, "Am I going to see color? Is it going to happen?" And if the brain gets too attached to that experience, we really release having a powerful mystical experience.

So part of the deck is, "Let's take that off the table. You're going to pull a card, it's going to have a color, you can immediately connect with a color, that's then going to lead you to an angel." So information is going to start to flow. But again, at the end of the day, we are the vessels of energy. Just because I have a wrench in my house doesn't mean I can fix my sink. I need to know something about plumbing, there needs to be an expert. So, any spiritual tool is an extension of who you are. It's an extension of the divine, it's inspiration. So it's going to open the door for you to relax and begin to connect with energy. That's really the intention from the aura side, to just take that off the table, let's see what spirit is starting to say, and then let it become playful and fun.

Colette:

I love that, I love that. Radleigh, can you give us some, I know you have so many stories, all right? You're the best storyteller. Actually, you both are really great storytellers, so I'd love to hear some of the more memorable stories that you have with angel encounters that were life-changing, either for yourself or other people.

Radleigh:

I think that my greatest, most powerful moments are actually not with the Archangels. People are really driven, I think, to loving the archangels, because we, as human beings, really like experts. And we really like categories. And so, we like it that Archangel Michael is wisdom and truth and safety and protection. And Raphael is physical healing and romantic relationships. And so we like that, it's like it fits in with Dougall's metaphor of, you don't call Michael to fix your plumbing, because he's a carpenter, right?

Colette: Right.

Radleigh:

And so we, as human beings, we really like that. And the archangels, by their very nature and their description, it's a very sexy concept. Not sexy from the standpoint of...

Colette:

No, no, I get it, I get it.

Radleigh:

It's a sexy concept.

Colette: Yeah.

Radleigh:

And so human beings are drawn to that. But the true unsung heroes, the true people on the front lines with us, are guardian angels. They're the ones that are with us 24/7. They're designed, by their very nature, to be with us, to be unconditionally loving. They follow us lifetime after lifetime after lifetime. They know things about ourselves we haven't the vaguest clue about. And so my most powerful experiences really have been with guardian angels, whether it was meeting my primary guardian angel for the first time, Joshua, or it was just being a 19 year old who'd fallen in love for the very first time, and been broken up with. And literally being in the backyard crying on the hood of my mother's Ford Galaxy, and literally hearing an angel say, "You're going to be all right. You will be loved again."

Oh, that's so beautiful.

Radleigh:

And I remember being absolutely distraught, and hearing that, and the tears just stopped. It just stopped. And I just stood up and was like, "Oh." And so angels can help us in these significant, big, amazing, powerful ways. And they can also help us in small, beautiful, kind ways. And the intensity of the love, the power of the unconditionalness of it, makes neither one of those greater than the others, because they're both so designed to resonate with our souls, that miracles abound, just small and large. They just do.

Colette:

I love the way you said that, because I've had three angel encounters my whole life. The first one was just before I got clean and sober, I hit bottom and I was a drug addict. Most people know that, I'm in recovery 37-and-a-half years now, maybe longer by the time this airs. But I had not slept or bathed, I had been in a drug dealer's house, I was holding onto a sink in a bathroom, looking at myself in the mirror, and seeing myself as I really was and knew I was going to die if I didn't change. I didn't know how. And I just said, "Help me." It was the first time in my life I ever knew what real surrender was. And there was this really strange, tangible light that came around me, and I heard, I didn't hear the voice in my ear, I heard it resounding in my whole being, "It's over." And I felt so protected. I had no idea what was going to happen next, but I knew I never had to go back there, and that I was about to walk into a new life. And that is so tangible.

And then the next time was when I actually did see something, where I was an aroma therapist, I was doing a massage, and I could feel myself leaving my body. And my arms were still going this, and my feet were being pulled out of my shoes. And I was like, "Oh, where? Oh no. Oh no." And I was like, "Where is this? What is happening?" And the next thing you know, I was in this really freaky building, and the floor was like a checkerboard, and there were all these columns, and this humongous being of light, that was so tall, tall as a building, looked down at me, it didn't really have a face. I really wasn't sure what it was. It scared the living bejesus out of me. I was like, "Oh my God."



And then it picked me up, it scooped me up, and I saw what looked like supposedly feathers, but it was really filaments of light that looked like feathers. And I was poking at it going, "Oh my God, you must be an angel!" I remember saying that, "I am clean and sober, this is not possible!" Right then. And then it hummed at me. It hummed. I will never forget that as long as I live. And then when everybody was doing those silly angel dances in the '80s, I'm totally dating myself now, but I was like, "Okay," like the harmonic convergence or whatever. So I was like, "Okay, I saw this angel, I'm going to call it back, it's coming." Nothing happened. And I was like really pissed off. Everybody was talking about their angels. But this really changed me beyond belief. I was in shock forever.

And then one day, completely when I gave it up and thought, "Okay, whatever!" Like, "Whatever!" And then I imagined in a meditation, the next thing, I was at the edge of a cliff and the same angel with this wing, not wing, it wasn't really a wing, but it looked like a wing. And I'm going, "This is why they painted it, it's not really wings, it's..." Came around me, and I just knew I'd be okay. And that was the last time I've ever seen that. But I know angels are real.

Radleigh:

I love that you were swooped up into a room that had a checkerboard floor, because to me, that's like the game of life. You were literally picked up as a chess piece. And I guess here's where you are in the game of life right now, I'm just going to hold you and squeeze you and call your name George, and then I'm going to put you back down. That's a Bugs Bunny reference, by the way. And put you back down on the chess piece, and you'll never be the same, because you knew.

Colette:

I was never the same.

Radleigh:

And that's the way angels are. I think that one of the things that people get confused about, and they have to stop to remember, is that we have these powerful experiences, and we are constantly in search of the next one. Once you've had one, you just want the next one. It is a little bit like a drug thing. It's like once you've had the high, you just want the next one.

Yeah, you want to go get it again. Hurry up, come back, come back, come back.

Radleigh:

And angels are a spiritual high. And yet, unfortunately, our existence in this domain and this incarnation is that you don't get to live there.

Colette:

No.

Radleigh:

And so they show up when we need them the most, and they show up to literally help us to remember that it's real, and that the high is there, but you're going to have to go through the game of life the way you were destined to go through it.

Colette:

Yeah, and there's way more to the story, which I won't share, but thank you. This is a really interesting description. So Dougall, have you ever had a really jarring experience with reading an aura, or seeing someone's aura?

Dougall:

Yeah, I think one of the first, most jarring experiences for me was I was probably 16 or 17, and I was in chemistry class, and I used to be made fun of a lot. So as the class clown, I would deflect attention to the teacher. And I would make fun of them. And if I'm going to be fully vulnerable and totally honest, tear them apart. Terrible, terrible things.

And I remember sitting in class, and our chemistry teacher was fairly confident, and physically looked like it didn't bother her. And I just said something that really cut deep, and I immediately saw her energy, and it was completely different. And I will never forget it. I remember pausing and thinking, first of all, my words, my energy, my behavior can actually affect the soul and vibration of another person. So there's big responsibility for me there. We leave an imprint, our aura leaves an imprint on the room. It can change the energy of other people. And when an



aura is sort of aggravated, it gets this really bright, sort of vibrant, almost on fire, if you will, kind of look to it. And that means it's irritated or it's activated or it's triggered in some way. And I could see the difference between her divine self versus what she was portraying as her physical self.

Colette:

So interesting.

Dougall:

And I just remember stopping and thinking, "I cannot cause other people pain because I am in pain. That's not the direction that I want to go in." And so, when you see someone's energy, whether it's your own or somebody else's, there's this moment of pause that there's something bigger going on, that we radiate, that we sparkle. And sometimes environments make us sparkle less, whether it's because we're being confined, or criticized, or judged, or can't be our most authentic selves. And I just think it's interesting, collectively, that, and this may sound simple, but if we choose kindness, if we hold space for each other, if we used positive words, people radiate and they sparkle. And that's what I want to do. And fundamentally, that's the kind of friends that I want, the kind of family that I want, the kind of work that I want, let's just sparkle, because why not?

Colette:

I hundred percent agree with you, a hundred, thousand, million percent. It is simple, but don't we overcomplicate everything? Truly.

Dougall:

A hundred, yeah, yeah.

Colette:

Truly, the simple way, I think, is the right way. And the other thing is too, is that our biggest issue is that we are separate from God, and we continue to act through that lens of scarcity, et cetera. And just giving kindness and compassion and love opens up a kind of abundance that is so much more meaningful than chasing things and fighting for things, et cetera. I agree with you a hundred percent. Let me ask you a question about this. One day I was in a bar. I don't go to bars now, obviously.

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Dougall:

Back in the day, I was in a bar.

Colette:

Back in the day. And I saw somebody, and I've never forgotten this, and I've actually never talked to you about this, but I actually saw someone that had a black energy around them, and it was very like you were looking at a black hole, in a way, but it was like matte, like matte black. It didn't shine, right? And I was really frightened. What is that?

Dougall:

It's interesting, this is a big joke that people will say with me like, "Oh, I bet you see black or brown in my aura." As if earth tones are a bad thing, and they're not. Earth tones are powerfully, powerfully informational, and they have a lot to give us. Earth tones are typically about grounding. So black, when it's at its light form, is more like obsidian. If it sparkles, if it radiates, this person is really grounded, this person is connected to goddess energy.

Colette:

Right, this was not it.

Dougall:

If it's matte or opaque, this person is ungrounded, probably has a challenge with their mother, maybe is doing something that's actually taking them out of their body. So here you are in a bar, most people don't go to a bar to feel grounded and integrated in their body.

Colette:

No.

Dougall:

They go to a bar to be out of their body. So if you're seeing black, it's not a bad thing, it's nothing to be afraid of.



No, no, I get it, I get it.

Dougall:

Exactly. But it's a symbol that this person needs grounding. With any aura color, if it is opaque, it is leaning towards the shadow. If it is clear and it's light and it's sparkly, then everything's going pretty well with that color. But if it's opaque, there's a lesson there. Black, brown, gray. This is also interesting about these colors. You notice people who are highly creative wearing a lot of black, brown, and gray, and that's because they have so many ideas, so many things going through them, they want to be grounded. Some of the most popular designers out there, like fashion designers who work with all this beautiful color and all these shapes and sizes, always just wear all black. And that's because they're so overstimulated, they want to feel grounded. So in that situation, my guess is that person was particularly ungrounded, and maybe even had some wounds connected to their mother.

Colette:

Oh, that was very interesting, you said the wound connected to the mother, because I had an intuitive hit that this was a misogynist.

Dougall:

Mm, yes.

Colette:

And he was very attractive, really good-looking guy, that was kind of... And I was like, "Ooh, ooh, danger, danger. Don't go near this person." Right?

Dougall:

Yeah. Because it can even be materialism. If someone has a lot of earth tones in their aura, that means they're too attached to the third dimension, especially if they're opaque. And so if we think of feminine and goddess energy, we want to remember that plants are beautiful, and mother nature's beautiful, and the things the Earth can provide on its own, aside from material things. But yeah, it's a super, super powerful color.



Radleigh, have you ever had a very jarring and upsetting... Everybody always talks about angels. I was scared shitless of my angel, just so you know. So I was like, "Who are you? Oh my God. Put me down, put me down, put me down." I'm like, "I don't know if I like this! And why do you know everything about me?" It was really freaky. But after that, I really say that I did feel a lot of love. But let's say, have you ever had to call on an angel because you felt somehow threatened, or that you were in a situation that was threatening?

Radleigh:

I talk to the angels every single day. I literally have a mantra that I do morning and night, and you can look at it from, I guess, from a standpoint that a lot of my prayers are... Oh, in football, there's the deep offensive...

Colette:

Huddle?

Radleigh:

It's almost like an offensive standpoint.

Colette:

Offensive, right.

Radleigh:

Where it's like, "Dear Archangel Michael, please bless and protect my family, keeping them safe and free from harm in all ways medical and physical. Let them..." And it's this whole thing. And it's about this angel for safety and protection, and this angel for abundance and prosperity, and this angel to protect my children, my dogs. So I do that every day. But literally, every time something seems weird or off or strange, I pick the archangel. This is what I really do, I ask for my guardian angels, but I also bring in the archangels, because why not? They're there.

Colette:

Right, they're available.



Radleigh:

And so yeah, I do that all the time. And we, as human beings, do, I think, have this tendency to forget to pray from the standpoint of, "Thank you for all the wonderful things." And instead we're like the, "Oh my God, save me." Those kinds of prayers. And so I think everybody, including me, has these moments where it's like, "Oh my God, save me." I think I'm a pretty grounded person, I think, for the most part. So I don't tend to panic, but my husband panics enough for everybody, so...

Dougall: That's true.

Radleigh: So, I...

Colette:

As does David, as does Dougall.

Dougall:

He's a panicker, yeah.

Radleigh:

David's a panicker.

Colette:

He's a panicker too?

Radleigh:

Yeah. David and Lee are both panickers. But it's like, I do ask for angels' help, all the time. But the thing that I just really want people to get is that you don't have to wait until it's an emergency, until it's a disaster. We have this thing that we do where it's like, if we need a parking space, we ask for the help of an angel whose name is Walter. And that has this whole long thing where it's just like, "Walter, we need a parking space."

Radleigh's Walter, please help us.

Radleigh:

Seriously, it works! Try it. Try it!

Colette:

We have a parking fairy.

Radleigh:

Okay, whatever.

Colette:

I send out a parking fairy, but maybe it's Walter, and I didn't know.

Radleigh:

In the end, I'm a quintuple Sagittarius, nothing matters more than faith. Faith is everything. And so it's, where is your faith? Is your faith on this joyful, uplifting version of the reality you're trying to create? Or is your faith in this element of everything that will go wrong? It's like right now, Lee can't stop saying, "It's always something." I'm just like, "If you don't stop saying that, I am just literally not continuing anymore."

Dougall:

You will always complain.

Colette:

Right. It's always something good. It's always something great.

Radleigh:

There, thank you. I'm going to say that to him. But it's like we have to be in a place of faith about what we want. It doesn't matter if we have faith that it's Walter. Where I live, you're supposed to

say, "Dinah Shore, Dinah Shore, Dinah Shore." And you get a parking space. Why does that make sense?

Dougall:

Well, she is angelic.

Radleigh:

It does work.

Colette:

Right.

Dougall:

But can I say, Colette, one of the things that I learned from Radleigh when we first started becoming friends was the world of angels was something that I really hadn't studied. I'd dabbled, if you will, in just about most major categories of-

Colette:

Me too.

Dougall:

... metaphysics. And I kept asking myself, "Why did I never really explore this world?" And Radleigh and I would text each other, and maybe I'd say, "Oh, I'm waiting on something." And he'd tell me, "Well, call on this angel." Or I stubbed my toe, "Well, ask for healing with this angel." And we started talking, and he would always talk about how you just have to ask for their help. Radleigh would say that they're sort of shackled, and if you don't ask for them, they won't step in. Which was such a light bulb moment for me, because a huge weakness of mine is asking for help.

Colette:

Right, me too.



Dougall:

I have this belief system that I have to do it on my own. And every time Radleigh would say, "Well, did you ask for this person?" And I'd think, "Why aren't I asking?"

Colette:

Interesting.

Dougall:

What's wrong with saying, "Universe, I need you to support me versus guide me? I need some help today." That has been, aside from Radleigh being a fabulous friend, that has been the most interesting wisdom for me to weave into my own life personally, that I, or we, for everyone listening, are allowed to ask for help. That's huge.

Colette:

It is huge. It is huge. I remember being first introduced to the angel work that I found to be very profound was through John Randolph Price.

Radleigh:

Oh, yeah.

Colette:

He did a book. Yeah, you would know this book, for sure.

Radleigh:

Yes.

Colette:

Because it was written back in the '80s, or '70s, or '80s. I think it was called Angels Within Us, or Ask Your Angels. One of the two, I don't remember the name of it, or it could have been both. And for a time, I was very interested, then I stopped being interested, and all of a sudden lately I started being interested again. So I wanted to go find that. But then I realized, why? I'm friends with Radleigh, I can just read his book. Why would I...

Dougall:

Or cards!

Radleigh:

Text me!

Colette:

Or go get the cards? I could just text him in the morning with coffee and ask him, "So what do I do now?" But I love that. And I do think people need them now. So let's just talk about angels with the state of the world. What do you think, angels, what role do they play in the current state of the world? And how can we work with them to promote healing and unity? I know it's a big question, but...

Radleigh:

No, no, no, no, no, no, no. I love that. So there is an archangel whose name is Chamuel, C-H-A-M-U-E-L, and he comes in a pale green. And this archangel, there's a lot of things, there's a lot of lore around this particular archangel, that are things that are kind of like, eh, whatever. But the thing that I think that is the most important is that he is the archangel of personal and global peace. And I believe that those things are tied, because global peace doesn't come without personal peace. It is where we, as a human race, are disconnected from our own personal peace that we find ourselves in global turmoil.

And I do believe that, while things are not perfect, I think things, in my personal opinion, things are not designed to be perfect on planet Earth. It's a classroom of the roughest and rumble version. It's school in the bad part of town, galactically speaking. And so I think things without the angels would be far more dire, if not over. And I think the angels really have this whole element of trying to hold this mess that we call the human experience together for us on a personal space.

Colette:

I wonder if it's a human experiment.



Radleigh:

I think it is an experiment, but I also sort of think that we talk about this whole concept of people who, "Oh, they're a very old soul." And I believe that stuff, but I also sometimes really do wonder if there are any young souls on Earth, because I don't think they'd last long.

Colette:

Right, yeah.

Radleigh:

Sometimes I think the Earth is like this place we go when it's like, "I've already made it to level 87 in the video game. I'm going for level 88."

Colette:

"Can I please get out?"

Radleigh:

And the only way to get there is Earth.

Colette:

Right, yeah. Yeah, yeah, I get it.

Radleigh:

And I also have this belief system, just to follow that through, is that we talk about when we're here, we're like, "I'm never coming back here, I'm never doing this again, I am done, this is my last incarnation, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah, "But I think that life on Earth is a little bit like Disney. It's like you ride the scariest rollercoaster and then you get off and go, "Woo-wee, that was fun!" And we get right back into the queue. And so I think we do that here a little bit too, though I am still hoping for a better assignment next time.

Colette:

Yeah, I hear ya. So Dougall, what do you think that auras play in the current state of the world? Because we can call in color, can we not?

Dougall:

Of course, yeah.

Colette:

So, do you think if we could individually call in color, could we diffuse... There's so much polarization and divisiveness out there right now, there's so much hatred. One would think that it should be getting better, and to me it looks like it's getting worse. Now, not in my world, because I don't focus on all of that, because I know that I will not be able to function if that's all I see, so I have to find some way of creating beauty. Like you do over here, to counterbalance it. But I wonder if there could be a color we could call in to help also. That'd be pretty simple, would it not?

Dougall:

Yeah. I don't know if it's getting worse, I just wonder if we're seeing it through a clearer lens or we're hearing it differently. You know what I mean? So, Radleigh said something interesting. When I see the state of the world, as an empath, as an intuitive, as a light worker, sometimes other issues and challenges of the world feel bigger than my mind can comprehend. And what happens is I move into this apathetic state of, "There's nothing that I can do." And that's not true. Our state of being, our vibration, actually makes a difference on the planet. And we have to remember those things. That there may be something going on in another time zone, or another part of the world, and it may feel too far outside of your backyard, but if you meditate, and you visualize whatever color you want, purple, gold, pink, red, green, whatever it is, and then you wear that color, and you go to the grocery store, and you exude energy, and you're kind to someone who reaches for a melon before you do, it really does make a difference.

People are popping off on a plane right now, on airplanes, and going bonkers because they don't know what to do with their energy. But if we set our energy, if we set our intention, if we visualize beautiful, sparkling energy radiating from us, inviting the angels to join us on the journey for the day, it literally does make a difference. And I know a lot of empaths and sensitive people probably listen to your show and follow all of our work and think, "What am I supposed to do?" The best thing you can do is be. Be a light worker, move energy, bring brownies to your

neighbor, snip some roses from your yard and deliver them to a stranger. That does literally radiate and change the planet.

Colette:

And even just smile.

Dougall:

Just smile.

Colette:

At the person who looks really stressed out in line at the... I always tend to talk to people, my husband can't stand it, like when I'm in a line, he goes, "Why are you talking to all those strangers?" "Because that one looks really sad."

Dougall:

Yeah, yeah.

Colette:

Right? It's true, it is that simple, what we do ourselves individually, many of us don't think any of it's going to count, but the smallest things count in the hugest ways.

So here's what I'd love to do. Just before we go to our next section of the Wooniverse, I would love us to pull a card from your deck and say what do the angels and the auras have to... Because I feel like auras are also alive, right? I feel that they're living things. I'm an animist, I think everything's alive. So, please pull a card to say, what message do all of us need right now?

Radleigh:

All right, so the card that I...

Dougall:

This is the first time we've done this.

Colette:

Yay!

It is the first time. So the card...

Colette:

Oh, we're baptizing it on my show? Yay!

Radleigh:

The card that I pulled is Raziel, rainbow.

Colette:

Ooh, rainbow.

Radleigh:

And the card says, "Enlightened, adaptable, soulful, and connected." And the card is upside right. Now, if it was upside down, we have the upside down shadow words, but that's not what I pulled, I pulled it upside right. So enlightened, adaptable, soulful, and connected.

Dougall:

And what I love about that from the aura perspective is when you see rainbow around someone, when you see multiple colors, that means they get it. That means they understand that they're multifaceted, they can do multiple things, they can shift and transform their energy. It's the essence of enlightenment. So if we see beauty in everyone, that they can be whatever they want to be, they can be whoever they are, isn't that just like the secret of all?

Colette:

And isn't unity and diversity the point? Because isn't it the rainbow-

Dougall:

100%.

... represents diversity too, right?

Dougall:
Yeah.

Colette:

This is beautiful! Okay, we're going to take a little break now, and when we come back, we're going to switch gears, and enter into another dimension of the Wooniverse, the Tea Time After Party. So please stay with us, we'll be right back.
